



HISTORICAL DEVELOPMENT

The establishment of a statistics unit in Kenya dates back to 1961 with the passing of the Statistical Act (Cap. 112) by the Legislative Council. This Act provided for "the collection, compilation, analysis, and publication of statistical information, and for taking of censuses, and for matters connected with the foregoing and incidental there-to". The unit's predecessor, the East African Statistical Department (EASD) had been established way back in 1948 to provide statistical services to the three East African countries of Kenya, Uganda and Tanganyika.

With Kenya attaining its independence in 1963, and with the creation of the Ministry of Planning and National Development soon thereafter, the unit was upgraded to the Statistics Department, being headed by a Chief Statistician. In 1972, the Statistical Department of the Ministry of Planning and National Development was designated as the Central Bureau of Statistics and the title of its head was changed to "Director". "KENYA NATIONAL BUREAU OF STATISTICS" was established through an Act of Parliament, the statistics Act 2006 (Kenya Gazette Supplement No. 61 Act No. 4 of 2006) and the date of commencement was 1st Feb 2007. The Act provides for the post of Director General who is the Chief Executive Officer of the Bureau and Secretary to the Board and the Committees.

The main objective of the Act is to confer autonomy of the KNBS by establishing it as a corporate body, to prescribe its functions and provide for the the appointment of the Board to manage the affairs of the Bureau. The functions of the Bureau shall be to collect, compile, analyse, publish and disseminate statistical information and the coordination of the National Statistical System and for connected purposes.

PROFILE OF THE BUREAU

VISION

The vision for the new Kenya National Bureau of Statistics is “To become a centre of excellence in Statistical Production and Management for National Development.

MISSION

The mission of the Bureau, is “Coordinate and supervise the National Statistical System; produce and disseminate comprehensive, integrated, accurate and timely statistics required mainly to inform national development initiatives and processes; and develop and maintain social economic database”.

VALUES

The corporate values of the Bureau are user orientation, credibility, integrity and quality awareness. In addition to these values, an environment where everyone can contribute fully and can develop as an individual. The functions of KNBS fall into the following four categories:

- Data collection
- Data analysis and production of official statistics
- Dissemination of results to users and producers
- Archiving of survey and census results data

TEAMWORK

Together with all our partners, users, producers and development partners, we are committed to turn statistical challenges of the 21st century into opportunities.

THE STRUCTURE OF KNBS

KNBS comprises of six divisions and one independent unit. Four divisions are housed in Herufi House while the other two are housed in Nyayo House. The six divisions are:

- Industrial and Labour Statistics
- Population and Social Statistics
- Data Processing, Research and Publications
- Agriculture, Nutrition and Environmental Statistics
- Macro Economic and National Income Accounts Statistics
- National Sample Survey and Evaluation Program and Field Administration. Poverty Analysis and Research Unit

The Bureau maintains the National Sampling Survey and Evaluation Programme (NASSEP), which provides the framework for designing household surveys to generate different forms of household based data. It maintains a Master File of all establishments in the country. The Master File provides a framework of collecting establishment based data.

KNBS has an elaborate infrastructure for data collection such as District Statistical Officers and trained enumerators in every district. The Bureau is also the custodian of all government statistical information and for this it maintains a database of all national surveys including National Population and Housing Censuses.

KNBS provides a range of statistics to various organizations on request. The information is usually requested for research or publications of the country's socio-economic profiles.

DESCRIPTION:

This report examines the incidence, depth and severity of Poverty in Kenya, based on the second round of the Welfare Monitoring Survey (WMS II) series carried out in the months of June to September 1994. A baseline poverty profile was produced in 1994 using the 1981/82 Rural Household Budget Survey (RHBS) and the first round of Household Welfare Monitoring Survey (WMS) carried out in 1992.

This report is, therefore, the second Poverty profile produced since the Government embarked on the evaluation of poverty situation in the country following the observed negative effects of structural adjustment programs on some vulnerable segments of the society. It provides a clear understanding of who the poor are, the constraints that they face and the factors that engender and entrench their poverty. It also explores the situation of those in absolute poverty before considering the relative situation. Absolute poverty lines are built up from the cost of purchasing a basket of what may be considered basic needs of food and non-food items. Nutritional requirements are also discussed. This information is therefore necessary in formulating and designing effective poverty reduction policies and programmes.



The report extensively analyses and compares social indicators for poor and non-poor, male and female and social-economic groups. 

DESCRIPTION:

In 1997 the third Welfare Monitoring Survey was conducted between March - May 1997.

The survey was necessitated by previous information on the nature and extent of poverty brought out in WMS II and the need for strategies to tackle poverty.

The report adopted a monetary measure of living standards, using consumption rather than income. Well-being is measured by expenditure on basic needs for survival: food, clothing, health, shelter and education. The poor are defined as those members of society who are unable to afford basic minimum needs. This report also defines poverty in "Absolute" rather than "Relative" terms, referring to those who cannot meet the universally recommended minimum requirements for human survival. This report therefore creates a deeper understanding and awareness about Kenyans' living conditions. It also provides a detailed analysis of poverty by social-economic groups and its importance in delivery systems, locating and designing specific interventions. It also discusses their poverty interventions strategies and programmes in the country.



The third Welfare Monitoring Survey was carried out between February and May and September and November 1997. It captured three modules namely; Expenditure, and Agriculture, which were used to capture the Welfare information and the core module, which included aspects of household demographics, education, and health. The expenditure module captured household expenditures on Food and Non-Food items.



The agriculture module captured information on farms and non-farm informal enterprises. This report is mainly based on data from the core and expenditure modules. It further assesses the social economic factors associated with poverty, based on the analysis of WMS III. It broadens the understanding of the factors responsible for the high poverty levels and vulnerability in the country. It forms a basis for all the partners in development process, to identify, design and refocus their poverty interventions strategies and programmes in the country.



DESCRIPTION:

In keeping with visual presentation of poverty situation in Kenya, this report gives spatial view of poverty. This makes it easy to instantly observe regional differences. The map transcends all barriers of illiteracy and languages and where the audience may not have the time to calculate and observe the trends for themselves. This Atlas has been developed using a Geographic Information System (GIS) technique to visually present information at district level. It contains 34 maps showing the geographic distribution of some of the selected characteristics of the survey population. To supplement the information generated by the (WMS III) some of the data used in the compilation of the Atlas is secondary, particularly that which relates to HIV/Aids. The atlas provides strong visual presentation of key elements emerging from analysis of the WMS III.



DESCRIPTION:

The primary objectives of the 1999 National Medium and Small Enterprise (MSE) Baseline Survey was to update and expand the information generated from the 1993 and 1995 surveys and improve the reliability of estimates on the sector's contribution to the Kenyan economy in terms of employment, incomes, and gross domestic product (GDP).

More specifically this survey sought to measure the size and structure of the sector by estimating the total number of Micro and Small enterprises in the country in order to understand the various distribution aspects, including type of activity, sub-sector classification rural - urban distribution, size of enterprise and gender distribution. It reveals that Micro and Small Enterprises employ 2.4 million Kenyans. The survey also measured the contribution of the sector to employment by analysing the composition and structural variations of employment by enterprise activity, size, status, ownership, skills and education, and rural-urban aspects. The survey not only assessed the contribution of the sector to income but also conducted a macro-economic estimation of the total labour force contribution to GDP. It also analysed the entrepreneurship and business characteristics in the context if demand and supply of business support services, including credit infrastructure, training, and technology, business entry and closures, constraints and recommendations.

The 1998/99 Integrated Labour Force Survey (ILFS) was the first of its kind to integrate three related surveys (Labour Force, Informal Sector and Child Labour Modular Surveys) into a single cost-effective survey. It was conducted over the whole country on the Household-based NASSEP III sample frame and covered 11,049 Households out of the 12,814 household randomly selected for interview giving a response rate of 86.2 per cent.



As such, the survey collected a wider range of representative information that can be used in the design, implementation, monitoring and evaluation of various policies and programmes.


In particular, it provides indicators such as schools enrolment rates, housing conditions the levels of access to amenities and facilities, income expenditure and unemployment inputs into the monitoring and evaluation of the economic reforms and poverty reduction programmes that are being implemented by the Government.

The KDHS provides detailed information on Fertility levels, marriage, sexual activity, fertility preferences, awareness and use of family planning methods, breast feeding practices, Nutrition status of women and young children, Childhood and maternal Mortality, Maternal and Child Health, awareness and behaviour regarding HIV/AIDS, and other sexually transmitted infections (STDS).



The new features of 2003 KDHS include the collection of information on Malaria and use of Mosquito nets, domestic violence and HIV testing of adults.

The survey utilized a two stage sample based on the 1999 population and Housing Census and was designed to produce separate estimates for key indicators for each of the eight provinces in Kenya.




DESCRIPTION
